Special Status | Bihar | 08 Jun 2024

Why in News?

In the aftermath of the <u>General Elections</u>, the **Janata Dal (United)** and the **Telugu Desam** Party have emerged as influential players in government formation at the Centre.

Their renewed emphasis on securing <u>special category status</u> for **Bihar and Andhra Pradesh** has reignited discussions on this crucial issue.

Key Points

- Special Category Status is a classification provided by the Central government to support the development of states facing geographical and socio-economic challenges.
 - Currently, 11 States in India have SCS which are Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Himachal Pradesh, Jammu and Kashmir, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland, Sikkim, Tripura, and Uttarakhand.
- Special category status offers benefits to designated states such as enhanced funding, with 90% of funds for centrally-sponsored schemes provided by the Centre.
 - These states can carry forward unused funds from one fiscal year to the next and enjoy tax concessions. They also receive a higher allocation from the Centre's Gross Budget, amounting to 30%.

Special Category Status (SCS)

- The Constitution does not make a provision for SCS and this classification was later done on the recommendations of the 5th Finance Commission in 1969.
- Status was first accorded to Jammu and Kashmir, Assam and Nagaland in 1969.
- SCS for plan assistance was granted in the past by the National Development Council of the erstwhile Planning Commission.
- SCS is different from Special status which imparts enhanced legislative and political rights, while SCS deals with only economic and financial aspects.

Haryana Government Removes Age Retention on Scheme | Haryana | 08 Jun 2024

Why in News?

Recently, the Haryana government lifted the age limit cap on a scheme aimed at providing <u>financial</u> <u>assistance to farmers</u> and farm labourers in the event of death or disability while operating agricultural machinery.

Key Points

- The government has decided to eliminate the age restriction under the 'Mukhyamantri Kisan Evam Khetihar Mazdoor Jeevan Suraksha Yojana' for farmers, agricultural labourers, and market yard labourers.
- Under this scheme, financial assistance ranging from Rs 37,500 to Rs 5 lakh is provided to farmers, agriculture labourers, and market yard labourers.
 - Previously, the scheme stipulated that the age of the beneficiary should be between 10 and 65 years.
- Now, children younger than 10 years and persons older than 65 years will also be eligible for benefits under the scheme.

IIIT-A Achieves QS World University Ranking | Uttar Pradesh | 08 Jun 2024

Why in News?

Indian Institute of Information Technology, Allahabad has achieved the worldwide ranking 1,401 and holds the **46th position** in the overall category in the <u>QS World University Ranking 2025</u>.

Key Points

- QS World University Rankings are released annually by **Quacquarelli Symonds (QS)**.
- The rankings evaluate the performance and quality of universities worldwide.
- The methodology considers indicators such as academic reputation, faculty-student ratio, employer reputation, sustainability, employment outcomes, international research network, citations per faculty, international faculty ratio, and international student ratio.
- They provide rankings by subject, region, student city, business school, and sustainability.

Dehradun Litchis Hit by Heat | Uttarakhand | 08 Jun 2024

Why in News?

The extreme heat in **Uttarakhand**, with temperatures exceeding **42** °C, has caused **litchis** to **dry out** and **suffer damage** from **cracking**.

Key Points

- The rise in heat waves has affected the fruit's overall growth and maturation.
- Litchi trees takes water from the soil, aiding in seed growth and aril development.
- The tubercell's red skin has been exposed to heat and cracked, it has caused a decrease in cell elasticity, impacting the fruit's juiciness, size, and succulence.
- Ramnagar litchi, recognized with a <u>Geographical Indication (GI)</u> certificate, is in high demand in nearby states like Chandigarh, Delhi, and Haryana.
- <u>Pomologists</u> caution against harvesting litchis too soon because litchis from Bihar enter the market before those from Uttarakhand.
 - Picking them early may result in the presence of tart and undersized litchis.
 - To enhance the flexibility of the young litchi fruits left on the trees, it is recommended to water them in the morning and evening while also using boron and **gibberellic acid.**

Litchi

- Botanical Classification: Litchi belongs to the Sapindaceae family and is known for its delicious, juicy, translucent aril or edible flesh.
- Climatic Requirements: Litchi thrives in sub-tropical climates and prefers moist conditions. It grows best in regions with low elevation, up to an altitude of around 800 meters.
- Soil Preference: The ideal soil for litchi cultivation is deep, well-drained loamy soil rich in organic matter.
- **Temperature Sensitivity:** Litchi is sensitive to extreme temperatures. It does not tolerate temperatures above **40.5°C** in summer or freezing temperatures in winter.
- Rainfall Impact: Prolonged rain, especially during flowering, can interfere with pollination and affect the crop adversely.
