Why in News?

India took a major step forward in its commitment to **cutting-edge_<u>biomedical research and</u>** <u>innovation</u> by inaugurating the nation's first **Ferret Research Facility**, launching the <u>GARBH-INI-DRISHTI</u> data repository, and finalizing a key technology transfer agreement.

 The event was held at the <u>Translational Health Science and Technology Institute (THSTI)</u> in the NCR Biotech Science Cluster, Faridabad, Haryana.

Key Points

- THSTI Ferret Research Facility:
 - India inaugurated the THSTI Ferret Research Facility, a state-of-the-art establishment adhering to the **highest biosafety and research standards**.
 - The facility plays a crucial role in vaccine development, therapeutic testing, and research on emerging infectious diseases.
 - It strengthens <u>India's pandemic preparedness strategy</u> and enhances its position in global scientific research.
- GARBH-INI-DRISHTI:
 - GARBH-INI-DRISHTI is a pioneering DBT Data Repository and Information Sharing Hub at THSTI.
 - The platform provides clinical data, images, and biospecimens from over 12,000 pregnant women, newborns, and postpartum mothers.
 - As one of South Asia's largest maternal and child health databases, it enables researchers to conduct transformative studies to improve maternal and neonatal health outcomes.
 - This initiative represents a collaborative effort among India's leading research institutions and hospitals, fostering a strong research ecosystem.
- Technology Transfer Agreement:
 - THSTI signed a Technology Transfer Agreement with M/s Sundyota Numandis Probioceuticals Pvt. Ltd. to commercialize its innovative microbial consortium, Lactobacillus crispatus.
 - Isolated from the reproductive tracts of women enrolled in the GARBH-INi cohort, this synthetic microbial consortium holds immense potential for nutraceutical applications.
 - The agreement facilitates the translation of research into real-world health solutions through **targeted microbiome-based interventions.**

Garbh-Ini

- Garbh-Ini (Interdisciplinary Group for Advanced Research on Birth Outcomes—DBT India Initiative) was initiated by the Department of Biotechnology (DBT), in 2014 as a collaborative interdisciplinary program.
- This program is led by Translational Health Science and Technology Institute (THSTI), NCR Biotech cluster, Faridabad.
- It aims to elucidate biological and non-biological risks of preterm birth (PTB) to create important knowledge-driven interventions and technologies that can be sustainably

Mahri Laado Radio Programme | Haryana | 06 Feb 2025

Why in News?

The Haryana government launched the flagship initiative "Mahri Laado" Radio Programme, which has become an exemplary success story under the <u>Beti Bachao Beti Padhao (BBBP) scheme.</u>

Key Points

- Beti Bachao Beti Padhao (BBBP) Scheme:
 - The Government of India launched the Beti Bachao Beti Padhao (BBBP) scheme on 22nd January 2015 in Panipat, Haryana.
 - This initiative aims to address the declining <u>Child Sex Ratio (CSR)</u> and ensure that girls and women receive equal opportunities, care, and dignity.
 - Objectives of the BBBP Scheme:
 - Increase sex ratio at birth through awareness and interventions.
 - Improve institutional deliveries for maternal and child health.
 - Enhance girls' enrolment in secondary education and curb dropout rates.
 - Encourage early Antenatal Care (ANC) registration for maternal well-being.
 - Promote awareness on safe Menstrual Hygiene and Management (MHM).
- Mahri Laado Radio Programme:
 - It was launched on **16th August 2024** as a key initiative under BBBP.
 - This community-driven programme aims to address gender inequality, empower girls, and promote the value of daughters in Haryana.
 - **Broadcast Schedule:** Every Wednesday and Thursday on <u>All India Radio (AIR)</u> stations-Chandigarh, Hisar, Rohtak, and Kurukshetra.
 - **Content Format:** The 15-minute segments include stories, interviews, and discussions to engage communities on gender equality and empowerment.
- Mobilization Strategies for Maximum Outreach:
 - The Government of Haryana adopted a comprehensive approach to extend the programme's reach.
 - Key stakeholders mobilized communities:
 - District Programme Officers (DPOs) and Child Development Project Officers (CDPOs).
 - <u>Anganwadi Workers</u> and staff from One Stop Centers (OSCs), <u>Pradhan Mantri</u> <u>Matru Vandana Yojana (PMMVY)</u>, and <u>POSHAN Abhiyaan</u>.
 - Listening sessions were organized at Anganwadi Centers (AWCs), involving both men and women in discussions.
 - Digital Accessibility:
 - Participants were encouraged to download **the "News on AIR" app** for easy access.
 - Guidelines on app usage were shared via WhatsApp, telephone, and email.

Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yojana (PMMVY)

- It is a maternity benefit programme being implemented in all districts of the country with effect from 1st January, 2017.
- It is a <u>centrally sponsored scheme</u> being executed by the Ministry of Women and Child Development.

• **Cash benefits are provided to pregnant women** in their bank account directly to meet enhanced nutritional needs and partially compensate for wage loss.

Poshan Abhiyan

- POSHAN Abhiyaan (National Nutrition Mission) was launched by the government on March 8, 2018.
- The Abhiyaan targets to reduce stunting, undernutrition, <u>anemia</u> (among young children, women and adolescent girls) and reduce low birth weight by 2%, 2%, 3% and 2% per annum respectively.
- The target of the mission is to bring down stunting among children in the age group 0-6 years from 38.4% to 25% by 2022.
- POSHAN 2.0:
 - The government has amalgamated various programmes with similar objectives such as Supplementary Nutrition Programme and POSHAN Abhiyaan under one umbrella-Mission POSHAN 2.0—for creating synergies in operations and adopting an integrated approach in the nutrition services mechanism.

Maoist killed in Encounter in Chhattisgarh | Chhattisgarh | 06 Feb 2025

Why in News?

Recently, security forces killed a <u>Maoist</u> in an encounter in Chhattisgarh's Kanker district. The gunfight erupted in a forest along the Kanker-Narayanpur border during an <u>anti-Naxal operation</u>.

Key Points

- Anti-Naxal Operation:
 - A joint team of **District Reserve Guard (DRG)** and **Border Security Force (BSF)** launched the operation based on intelligence inputs about the presence of Maoist cadres from the North Bastar and Maad divisions in the area.
 - **Since January 2025**, **50 Maoists have been killed** in separate encounters across Chhattisgarh.
 - The **Bastar division recorded the highest toll**, with 34 Maoists killed.
- Annual Maoist Casualties:
 - In **2024**, **security forces neutralized 219 Maoists** in various encounters across the state.

District Reserve Guard (DRG)

- The District Reserve Guard (DRG) is a specialized police unit in Chhattisgarh, established in 2008 to combat Maoist violence.
- It consists of specially trained personnel operating in affected districts, conducting anti-Maoist operations, search and seizure, and gathering intelligence.
- The DRG collaborates with other security forces, like the <u>Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF)</u>, to counter the Maoist insurgency.

Border Security Force (BSF)

- The BSF was raised in 1965, after the India-Pakistan war.
- It is one of the <u>seven Central Armed Police Forces</u> of the Union of India under the administrative control of the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA).
 - Other Central Armed Police Forces are: <u>Assam Rifles (AR)</u>, <u>Indo-Tibetan Border</u> <u>Police (ITBP)</u>, <u>Central Industrial Security Force (CISF)</u>, <u>Central Reserve Police</u> <u>Force (CRPF)</u>, <u>National Security Guards (NSG)</u> and <u>Sashastra Seema Bal (SSB)</u>.
- The 2.65-lakh force is deployed along the Pakistan and Bangladesh borders.

Badrinath Temple | Uttarakhand | 06 Feb 2025

Why in News?

The Badrinath temple in Uttarakhand's Chamoli district will open its sacred portals for devotees on 4th May 2025.

Key Points

- Decision on Badrinath Temple Opening:
 - On the occasion of **Basant Panchami**, priests decided the auspicious time for opening the Badrinath temple after performing special prayers.
- Annual Closing and Reopening of Char Dhams:
 - After Diwali, authorities close the <u>Char Dhams</u>—<u>Badrinath</u>, <u>Kedarnath</u>, <u>Gangotri</u>, and <u>Yamunotri</u>—for devotees.
 - The **portals reopen in April-May** the following year.

Char Dham Yatra

- Yamunotri Dham:
 - Location: Uttarkashi district.
 - Dedicated to: Goddess Yamuna.
 - <u>River Yamuna</u> is the second-most sacred river in India after <u>River Ganga</u>.
- Gangotri Dham:
 - Location: Uttarkashi district.
 - Dedicated to: Goddess Ganga.
 - Considered the most sacred of all Indian rivers.
- Kedarnath Dham:
 - Location: Rudraprayag district.
 - Dedicated to: Lord Shiva.
 - Situated on the bank of the Mandakini River.
 - One of the **<u>12 Jyotirlingas</u>** (divine representations of Lord Shiva) in India.
- Badrinath Dham:
 - Location: Chamoli district.
 - Home to the sacred Badrinarayan Temple.

- **Dedicated to:** Lord Vishnu.
- One of the holy shrines for Vaishnavites.

Zero LoC Infiltration | Jammu & Kashmir | 06 Feb 2025

Why in News?

Recently, **the Union Home Minister** conducted an extensive review of **the ongoing <u>anti-terror</u>** <u>operations</u> and the security situation along <u>the Line of Control (LoC)</u> in Jammu and Kashmir (J&K).

Key Points

- Meeting on Counter-Terrorism:
 - The Union Home Minister chaired a meeting with top Army and Police officials to strengthen **counter-terrorism operations** in the Valley.
 - The meeting also aimed to secure the Line of Control (LoC), especially during the <u>monsoon</u>, when rivulets from <u>the Himalayas</u> swell, creating gaps in the fencing along the Pakistan border.
- Security Challenges Along the LoC and Border:
 - The LoC spans 749 km, primarily under the Army's jurisdiction, while India and Pakistan share a 198 km long international border in the Jammu sector, where <u>Border</u> <u>Security Force (BSF)</u> is in charge.
 - In 2024, Jammu experienced a surge in terrorist attacks due to infiltrators from Pakistan.
- Zero Infiltration Goal and Terrorism Elimination:
 - The Minister directed security agencies to intensify efforts with a 'zero infiltration' goal, instructing forces to adopt a strict approach towards infiltration and <u>terrorism</u>.
 - The primary objective emphasized was to eliminate the presence of terrorists in the region.
 - The Minister acknowledged the role of narco-networks in supporting infiltrators and terrorists, urging immediate action against terror funding linked to the narcotics trade.

Border Security Force (BSF)

Bundelkhand: Center of Solar Energy | Uttar Pradesh | 06 Feb 2025

Why in News?

Uttar Pradesh is progressing rapidly in the field of **solar energy** and **Bundelkhand** has emerged as **a major centre of energy**, playing an important role in this progress.

Key Points

- Development of Solar Energy in UP:
 - The government has implemented a comprehensive **solar energy policy**, under which various incentives are being provided to solar energy projects.
 - In 2024, **17 solar power plants** with a capacity of about 1100 MW have become operational in the state..
 - These solar plants have created direct employment opportunities, underlining the significant economic impact of <u>renewable energy</u> expansion in Uttar Pradesh.
- Role of Bundelkhand:
 - Bundelkhand has emerged as a **major region in the field of renewable energy** and is promoting regional development and employment.
 - The abundant sunlight and climatic conditions in this region make it ideal for solar energy production.

Major projects:

- Solar power units of 4 thousand MW have been installed in Bundelkhand. Out of the 10 new solar plants installed in this region , 995 MW have started operating.
 - Jhansi Solar Power Project 600 MW project by TUSCO Limited commissioned in January 2025.
 - Along with this, a 100 MW solar plant by Fourth Partner Energy started in **Babina**, **Jhansi with an investment of Rs1200 crore in mid-2024**.
 - Another significant development in Bundelkhand is the Sun Source Energy Solar Open Access Project, which contributes an additional 135 MW to the state's energy grid.

Bundelkhand

- **Bundelkhand** is a geographical and cultural region located on the border of Uttar Pradesh and Madhya Pradesh.
- It is a semi-arid region comprising seven districts of Uttar Pradesh (Jhansi, Jalaun, Lalitpur, Mahoba, Hamirpur, Banda and Chitrakoot).
- It is also a mountain range. Jhansi is the largest city of Bundelkhand.
- Bundelkhand was earlier known as Jejabhukti or Jejakabhukti , but from the time of the Bundelas in the 14th century it came to be known as Bundelkhand.

New Director of Minority Affairs | Rajasthan | 06 Feb 2025

Why in News?

On 5th February 2025, Matadeen Meena, an Indian Administrative Service officer, took charge as Director of the Department of Minority Affairs.

Key Points

- After assuming charge, the officer visited the Madrasa Board to observe the functioning of various sections.
- During this, he took feedback from the officers and employees of the Directorate and instructed them to work with honesty, dedication, discipline and spirit of service.

Department of Minority Affairs

- The Government of Rajasthan established a new Minority Department in 2009 for the allround development and socio-economic and educational upliftment of the minority communities (Muslims, Sikhs, Christians, Jains, Buddhists and Parsis) of the state.
- This department reviews and coordinates policies, schemes and development programmes for the benefit of minority communities. This department is headed by the Minister of Minority Affairs and <u>Wakf</u>.

 - After this it merges with the Ganges in Munger distric
